



Liberal Arts Colleges

- Gives the student an opportunity to explore a variety of academic disciplines rather than following a specific rubric of courses that train them for a specific career.
- Similar to NV- focuses on critical thinking, interdisciplinary studies, inter/intra-personal skills, communication, and a well rounded education.

- Faculty of an art focused school will consist of professionals who have real-world experience and who may be recognized names in the field.
- Small size and small classes
- Networking opportunities
- Surrounded by like-minded people who share your passion for the arts.
- Access to state of the art equipment and studio space
- Sometimes credits do not transfer
- Can be very expensive

- Missing deadlines for financial aid, scholarships, auditions, or portfolios
- > Families do not discuss finances honestly
- Safety schools are not options where students would be happy
- > Students have difficulty limiting outside voices. Lose themselves in the process. (College choice, essay, etc.)
- ➤ Using nickname or not their legal name for applications. They will usually give you a spot for prefered name



Some Tips for Essays

- Start early.
- Be yourself.
- Be honest.
- Watch out for humor/slang.
- Don't thersaurasize.
- Answer the question.
- Write and rewrite.
- Get a second opinion.
- Proofread.
- Be accurate.
- Find an angle or hook.
- Stick to the word count.
- Write an ESSAY.

2 suggestions by a college admissions counselor:

- Remove the introductory and concluding paragraphs, and then see if your essay seems stronger.
 These paragraphs are often the most likely to have unnecessary detail.
- Go through the essay and cut out every "very" and every "many."
 Words like these are vague, and your writing is often stronger without them.

Essay Question Examples

- Some students have a background, identity, interest, or talent that is so meaningful they believe their application would be incomplete without it. If this sounds like you, then please share your story. (Common App)
- Every person has a creative side, and it can be expressed in many ways: problem solving, original and innovative thinking, and artistically, to name a few. Describe how you express your creative side. (UCs)
- Please complete the following, and have a little fun doing so (no more than 300 characters each):

I am empowered by people who...

I value my community because ...

I want to better my world by... (Carleton)



THINGS TO KNOW ABOUT LETTERS OF RECOMMENDATION

- Follow directions about who and how many
- Choose recommenders that can speak to different strengths.
 - o For example, an LA or SS teacher and a Math or Science teacher.
- Your counselor rec is written by <u>your advisor</u>
- You can also use a CE mentor, coach, or employer <u>only if the</u> <u>college allows.</u>
- Start early. Though 3 weeks is the standard turnaround time, giving your recommenders longer is preferred
- Teachers cap how many letters they will write
- Show gratitude



REQUESTING TRANSCRIPTS

- Request transcripts by filling out <u>this Transcript</u>
 <u>Request Form</u>. NOT ON NAVIANCE
- SAT scores will **NOT be** on your transcript
- Transcripts cost \$2 each. Pay on Revtrack
- You must give her 15 working days
- Julie will send transcripts electronically through Naviance.
- Letters of rec must be uploaded to Naviance <u>before</u>
 Julie submits transcripts
- Request Mid year and Final transcripts

Common Transcript Questions

Q: Should I request my transcripts through Naviance?

A: No, only use our transcript request form.

Q: Should I wait until after I apply to request my transcripts?

A: No, put in your requests right away. Your application and accompanying documents will be connected by the school you are applying to.

Q: Can I list all of my colleges on one request form?

A: No, please fill out a separate request form for each college.

Q: Will my SAT or ACT scores be on my transcript?

A: No. You will need to request your scores be sent directly from the testing agency.

Q: Will I be notified when my transcripts and accompanying docs have been sent?

A: No, however you are welcome to email the Registrar anytime with questions!

A few words of wisdom...


"Whenever there are irregularities relating to a student's academic program and/or performance, admission officers will look for explanations. Without an explanation, they will draw their own conclusions. Keep in mind that admission officers are, by their very nature, cynical. An unexplained change in schools for the senior year will be viewed as highly irregular, perhaps even as a "red flag." Left to draw their own conclusions, admission officers could conclude that the change was the result of a discipline issue, an infraction of school rules/policies or a calculated decision by the student to pursue a course of less resistance academically. While I seriously doubt that any of these explanations would apply to your son, I hope you see my point. He cannot risk those assumptions."





Release Authorization



The next screen will ask you two important questions about your release of and access to your educational records under FERPA, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act. Since FERPA is a complex law, we want to provide some key information before you respond.

1. How does FERPA relate to your college application?

FERPA gives you the right to review confidential letters of recommendation under certain circumstances IF:

- You are enrolled in college and that college saves the recommendations for enrolled students, OR
- You are 18 or older

2. In a moment you'll be asked if you want to waive this right. Why would you want to do that?

- Waiving your right lets colleges know that you do not intend to read your recommendations, which helps reassure colleges that the letters are candid and truthful.
- Some recommenders may refuse to write a letter for you unless you waive your rights. Check with
 your counselor or teachers to see if any of them follow such a policy.

3. Still unsure how to respond?


 That's OK. Many students are. Before you move on, take a moment to discuss your decision with your counselor, another school official, or your parent/legal guardian. For more information about FERPA, visit the <u>Help Center</u>.










Common Application & Naviance




"Match" your Common App and Naviance

Login to Naviance→Colleges → Colleges I'm applying to → Enter the email address you used when you created your Common App account and click "Match Accounts".




To Match, enter the email address you are using for Common App in your Naviance account under "Colleges I'm Applying to" section


Last minute advice for parents

Technical Institutes/Focused Colleges

- Course work focuses on skills for the workforce
- Typically award a certificate, diploma, or associate's degree.
- Offers internship experiences
- Usually offer job placement services
- Credits usually DO NOT transfer
- Includes a strong element of hands-on training

- May be part of community and junior colleges, and sometimes four-year colleges and universities
- Check for accreditation:
 Ensures that an institution has been evaluated and meets set standards of quality

Military

- Five branches: Army, Marine Corps, Navy, Air Force and Coast Guard
- 2 types of duty: active duty (full-time soldiers and sailors) and reserve & guard forces (usually work a civilian job, but can be called to full-time military duty)
- Recruiting office: 3055 Walnut St, Boulder, 303-442-1751
- ROTC (Reserve Officer Training Corps): Take classes in college to learn combat techniques, military tactics, and leadership training. Military pays for all or part of your education if you serve as an officer after graduation. (Freshman and sophomore can participate without obligation to join the Army.)

What are some benefits of joining the military?

- **Steady Income**: Paid twice a month, on the 1st & 15th, every month, based on your pay grade & service requirements.
- Advancement: Promoted based on job knowledge, performance, time in pay grade & service requirements.
- Paid vacation: Earn 2.5 days paid vacation per month for a total of 30 days each year.
- **Training**: Choose your career path based on aptitude, physical abilities, security clearance, motivation and determination.
- **Health Care**: While on active duty, receive complete medical and dental care at no cost.
- **Life Insurance**: While serving on active duty members can select inexpensive term life insurance.

- **Tax Advantage**: Only basic monthly pay is subject to Federal or State income tax.
- **GI Bill**: The Montgomery GI Bill will help pay for college education or vocational training.
- Tuition Assistance: While in the Reserves or Guard, you may continue your education, and may be helped in defraying the cost of college-accredited courses. Additionally, if you are in the National Guard some states offer substantial benefits such as free tuition to state colleges or universities.
- Additional Benefits: There are exchange and commissary privileges, temporary lodging expenses, travel, Veterans Administration home loans and more.
