





- Disrespectful to teachers


NVHS website has great instructions for reporting an absence- using IC or calling 8702.

Get doctors' notes when possibledentist, eye doctor, therapist- these absences will not count if there is a note.


Working on schoolwork from home will still be an absence.




What happens on Exhibition Day?


- Exhibition Day is on the last day of every quarter and is designed for students to showcase their best work and learning from the quarter.

- Such a fun day!






What is the Culminating Project?

The Culminating Project is an opportunity to undertake a major piece of rigorous, original work in an area of great interest and personal relevance to the student.

- It may involve work directly connected to the student's intended Path. (college, career etc...)
- It may involve exploration of Path options, interests, passions, etc.
- It may be a personal passion or interest a student wants to explore in a deeper way and take to a higher level of understanding/study.
- Culminating Projects are self-motivating experiences. The student chooses the project, designs it with input from their advisor and the Panel Team, and is solely responsible for its execution. The project is culminating in the sense that it brings together the student's skills and knowledge in carrying out a significant piece of self-directed learning.

Examples of Culminating Projects

- Prepared to obtain pilot's license
- Planned and led 200 mile backpacking trip along CO Trail
- Designed and fabricated a youth fashion line
- Created a portfolio of 3-D computer art
- Created a web site on resources for self-help in legal affairs
- Choreographed and performed original dance works
- Explored veterinary careers in Alaska
- Filmed and edited a snowboard video
- Studied the cultural anthropology of Hawaii
- Authored, directed, and acted in a theater production



Practice good school habits

Make school a priority

*Think of school as your job. To move forward, you must find ways to be successful.

Set Attainable Goals

*Break down large projects into sections, and focus on one section at a time. You can handle any project in small chunks.

Focus on High-Impact Activities

*Plan for your success by prioritizing your work. Do more difficult assignments first. Do bigger grade assignments first.

Make hard but helpful choices

- * Do not sleep with technology in your room
- * If possible, switch off technology at least an hour before bed
- * Don't hit snooze
- * Eat a protein filled breakfast

Go to lunch help

*Teachers offer support at lunch for all students. Check it out if you have a question, need motivation, or want help with an assignment.

Reward Yourself

* Set up small rewards for yourself when you complete school tasks. These may include time with friends, video games, a candy or treat, hike or bike ride, etc.

Get Organized



- Find and practice your system this summer
- Create a Daily/Weekly Schedule
- Make a To-Do list everyday- check things off your list as you complete them
- Keep track of assignment due dates
- Set reminders/to dos
- Find the time of day that works best for you
- Have a dedicated spot to do school work (not in your bedroom)
- Choose a set time each week to look at IC, Schoology, Google classroom with your parents
- Limit/ Schedule/Earn social media, gaming, movies/shows, etc

Balance Personal Issues With School Responsibilities



- Give yourself a designated amount of time to feel and process
- ☐ Take care of yourself
- ***Get a good night's sleep, Maintain a healthy diet, Practice gratitude, Get regular exercise, Practice mindfulness,

- Know your coping skills (and use them)
- * Write them down so you are reminded when things get tough. Not sure? Use the summer to figure them out. Brainstorm with others.
- ☐ Use your support team
- * Teachers, Counselors, Interventionist, Advisors, family, friends, therapists, coaches, mentors, etc.
- □ Do not be your friends' therapist

When personal issues and stress impact school performance, it's important to evaluate what's happening and seek support

Ask for Help/Advocate

When? Whenever you need support or have questions about anything. When you are stuck on an assignment. When personal issues are getting in the way of school performance. When you are struggling with getting organized. When you have good news and want to share. When you just need someone to talk to.



A few things to remember (that are really hard to remember when things are tough)

- Support should always empower your child to move forward toward greater stability and more independence. Support will acknowledge difficulties yet not eliminate them.
- It's ok to fold a bit of exposure therapy into modern parenting to help our young people grapple with a complex and stressful world.
- If we make the majority of choices for our children, we derail their opportunities to grow their confidence, they doubt their own ability to know what is best for them, and they look for others to make choices/decisions for them.
- There's no perfect way to parent. We all make mistakes. Acknowledge inwardly and outwardly, and move on.



A FEW THINGS FOR THE FALL

1: Web Program

- ★ Student gets their own Chromebook that they will take with them when they graduate from New Vista.
- ★ Incoming 9th Grade student there is a fee each year of \$59 you will pay through Rev Track (most updated devices)
- ★ Transfers students can get a device for \$59 (each year) plus the back fees depending on their year of school. Example: 10th Grade Transfer would pay \$118 and then \$59 the following year.
- ★ Parents need to sign the 1:Web agreement in the ADU
- ★ If a student has their own personal Chromebook they can opt out. We strongly request that students only have Chromebooks so that we can manage the use for educational purposes.
- ★ Students on free and reduced lunch have yearly fees waived.
